Of particular relevance to the EIA is the Bridgend Equality Forum. The draft plan was shared with members and they were asked to provide feedback using a range of methods including online, email telephone, postal. Forum Members were invited to request other formats if they needed them.	
	In addition a notice of an online consultation was published in the gazette newspaper (the main local paper for the county borough.) inviting views via email, telephone, postal or through our online consultation	
	The consultation on the corporate plan was then designed to test that we had applied those views in a clear and appropriate way. For this purpose we used a focus group drawn from our citizens' panel and facilitated by an independent consultant.
