Executive Summary:	For the Sub-Committee to consider and determine an application for the grant of a premises licence following representations received from "other persons"

1. Purpose of Report

1.1 The purpose of this report is to determine an application for the grant of a premises licence for V S Stores, submitted by Sukhwinder Singh.

2. Background

2.1 The Licensing Authority has received an application for the grant of a premises licence for V S Stores, 2 Prince Road, Kenfig Hill, CF33 6ED.

A copy of the application form and plan is attached at **Appendix A**.

- 2.2 The application requests the following licensable activities for the hours stated:
 - The Sale of Alcohol for consumption off the premises: Monday to Sunday 0600 to 2200 hours

3. Current situation / proposal

- 3.1 In accordance with the requirements of the Licensing Act 2003, copies of the application were forwarded to the Responsible Authorities.
- 3.2 During the statutory 28-day consultation period the application has been advertised in accordance with the regulations at the premises, in a local newspaper and on the Council's website.
- 3.3 South Wales Police and the applicant reached agreement on the imposition of an additional condition of licence, should the application be granted. The condition is:

Prevention of Crime and Disorder

The premises shall maintain a digital CCTV recording system capable of recording 31 days of 24 hour recording with a monitor out of view and reach of the customers. Images shall be retained for a period of 31 days. The equipment will be suitably secured with limited access. The CCTV system shall have coverage of all areas to which the public have access within the premises and shall include entrances and exits. The CCTV system shall be maintained and operate at all times that the premises are open to the public. Images shall be made available upon request and within 7 days to the Police or other enforcement officers either to USB, disc or via any system utilised by South Wales Police, upon lawful demand by a Police officer or Local Authority officer at no cost.

The CCTV system will be checked on a monthly basis to ensure that it is fully operational, and a log confirming this will be kept at the premises for inspection.

- 3.4 Representations were received from one "other person" (as defined by the Licensing Act 2003) in the consultation period.
- 3.5 These representations are detailed in *Appendix B*.
- 3.6 As relevant representations were received during the consultation period and not withdrawn the Sub-Committee must determine the application in accordance with the Licensing Act 2003.
- 3.7 The Licensing Act 2003 (Section 4) states that it is the duty of all Licensing Authorities to carry out their functions under the Act with a view to promoting the licensing objectives. The licensing objectives are:
 - a) The prevention of crime and disorder
 - b) Public safety
 - c) The prevention of public nuisance
 - d) Protection of children from harm

Each objective is of equal importance and should be of paramount consideration at all times. Issues such as the need for new premises, traffic or parking are not within the remit of the licensing authority.

Section 4(3) Licensing Act 2003 states that the Licensing Authority should also have regard to the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy, the statutory guidance issued under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 and the Licensing Act itself, in this case in particular to:

Sections 1, 4, 5, 6, 7, 9, 34, 35 and 36 of the Act. Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, and 7 to 11 of the 2019-2024 Statement of Licensing policy. Sections 2, 5, 8, 9, 10 and 14 of the Statutory Guidance to local authorities issued by the Home Office.

3.8 Further updates will be provided at the start of the Sub-Committee meeting as permitted under the Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005.

- 1. CCTV shall be installed to Home Office Guidance standards and maintained in a good working condition and recordings shall be kept for 31 days and shall be made available to police and authorised Officers from the council.
- 2. The CCTV system shall be capable of obtaining clear facial recognition images and a clear head and shoulders image of every person entering or leaving the premises.
- 3. The CCTV system shall display on any recordings, the correct date and time of the recording.
- 4. A member of staff trained in the use of the CCTV system shall be available at the premise at all times that the premises are open to the public.
- 5. A CCTV camera shall be installed to cover the entrance of the premises and further cameras installed to cover the internal area and servery counter.
- 6. A suitable intruder alarm complete with panic button shall be fitted and maintained.
- 7. An incident log shall be kept at the premises, and made available for Inspection on request to an authorised officer of the council or the Police, which will record the following:
- (a) all crimes reported to the venue
- (b) all ejections of patrons
- (c) any complaints received
- (d) any incidents of disorder
- (e) all seizures of drugs or offensive weapons
- (f) any faults in the CCTV system
- (g) any refusal of the sale of alcohol
- (h) any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service.
- 8. Staff training must be documented and based on legislation and operating procedures. All training shall be signed and dated, and a copy of such records will be available for inspection by Police and local authority enforcement officers.
- 9. All staff employed at the premises will have UK right to work status checked, once passed that stage they shall be offered employment.
- 10. All alcohol shall be purchased from AWRS registered cash & carry and wholesalers
- 11. There shall be no self service of spirits on the premises
- c) Public safety
- 1. Installation of appropriate safety equipment
- 2. Fire exit signs displayed
- 3. CCTV working at all times
- d) The prevention of public nuisance
- 1. Notice displayed asking customers to leave quietly from premises also customers will be told in person to leave quietly

- 2. Strict policy in place to tell all staff not to serve alcohol to drunks at all
- 3. Appropriate signage will be displayed, in prominent position informing customers they are being recorded on CCTV
- e) The protection of children from harm
- 1. A challenge 25 policy will be in force, where any person looking under the age of 25 shall be asked to prove their age when attempting to purchase alcohol and signs to this effect will be displayed at the premises. Challenge 25 posters displayed where alcohol is sold.
- 2. The only acceptable ID will be those with photographic identification documents, including passport, photo-card, driving license or proof of age card bearing the PASS hologram.
- 3. An refusal book shall be kept at the premises and updated as and when required, and made available for inspection on request to an Licensing Officer, Police or other responsible authority.
- 4. A sign stating "No proof of age No sale" shall be displayed at the point of sale.

NOTES ON DEMONSTRATING ENTITLEMENT TO WORK IN THE UK

Entitlement to work/immigration status for individual applicants and applications from partnerships which are not limited liability partnerships:

A licence may not be held by an individual or an individual in a partnership who is resident in the UK who:

- does not have the right to live and work in the UK; or
- is subject to a condition preventing him or her from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity.

Any premises licence issued in respect of an application made on or after 6 April 2017 will become invalid if the holder ceases to be entitled to work in the UK.

Applicants must demonstrate that they have an entitlement to work in the UK and are not subject to a condition preventing them from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity. They do this in one of two ways: 1) by providing with this application copies or scanned copies of the documents listed below (which do not need to be certified), or 2) by providing their 'share code' to enable the licensing authority to carry out a check using the Home Office online right to work checking service (see below).

Documents which demonstrate entitlement to work in the UK

- An expired or current passport showing the holder, or a person named in the passport as the child of the holder, is A British citizen or a citizen of the UK and Colonies having the right of abode in the UK [please see note below about which sections of the passport to copy].
- An expired or current passport or national identity card showing the holder, or a person named in the passport as the child of the holder, is a national of a European Economic Area country or Switzerland.
- A Registration Certificate or document certifying permanent residence issued by the Home Office to a national of a European Economic Area country or Switzerland.
- A Permanent Residence Card issued by the Home Office to the family member of a national of a European Economic Area country or Switzerland.
- A current Biometric Immigration Document (Biometric Residence Permit) issued by the Home Office to the
 holder indicating that the person named is allowed to stay indefinitely in the UK, or has no time limit on their
 stay in the UK.
- A **current** passport endorsed to show that the holder is exempt from immigration control, is allowed to stay indefinitely in the UK, has the right of abode in the UK, or has no time limit on their stay in the UK.
- A **current** Immigration Status Document issued by the Home Office to the holder with an endorsement indicating that the named person is allowed to stay indefinitely in the UK or has no time limit on their stay in the UK, **when produced in combination with** an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A birth or adoption certificate issued in the UK, when produced in combination with an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A birth or adoption certificate issued in the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man or Ireland when produced in
 combination with an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their
 name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A certificate of registration or naturalisation as a British citizen, when produced in combination with an
 official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a
 Government agency or a previous employer.

- A **current** passport endorsed to show that the holder is allowed to stay in the UK and is currently allowed to work and is not subject to a condition preventing the holder from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity.
- A **current** Biometric Immigration Document (Biometric Residence Permit) issued by the Home Office to the holder which indicates that the named person can currently stay in the UK and is allowed to work relation to the carrying on of a licensable activity.
- A **current** Residence Card issued by the Home Office to a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights or residence.
- A **current** Immigration Status Document containing a photograph issued by the Home Office to the holder with an endorsement indicating that the named person may stay in the UK, and is allowed to work and is not subject to a condition preventing the holder from doing work relating to the carrying on of a licensable activity **when produced in combination with** an official document giving the person's permanent National Insurance number and their name issued by a Government agency or a previous employer.
- A Certificate of Application, **less than 6 months old**, issued by the Home Office under regulation 18(3) or 20(2) of the Immigration (European Economic Area) Regulations 2016, to a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights of residence.
- Reasonable evidence that the person has an outstanding application to vary their permission to be in the UK
 with the Home Office such as the Home Office acknowledgement letter or proof of postage evidence, or
 reasonable evidence that the person has an appeal or administrative review pending on an immigration
 decision, such as an appeal or administrative review reference number.
- Reasonable evidence that a person who is not a national of a European Economic Area state or Switzerland but who is a family member of such a national or who has derivative rights of residence in exercising treaty rights in the UK including:-
 - evidence of the applicant's own identity such as a passport,
 - evidence of their relationship with the European Economic Area family member e.g. a marriage certificate, civil partnership certificate or birth certificate, and
 - evidence that the European Economic Area national has a right of permanent residence in the UK or is one of the following if they have been in the UK for more than 3 months:
 - (i) working e.g. employment contract, wage slips, letter from the employer,
 - (ii) self-employed e.g. contracts, invoices, or audited accounts with a bank,
 - (iii) studying e.g. letter from the school, college or university and evidence of sufficient funds; or
 - (iv) self-sufficient e.g. bank statements.

Family members of European Economic Area nationals who are studying or financially independent must also provide evidence that the European Economic Area national and any family members hold comprehensive sickness insurance in the UK. This can include a private medical insurance policy, an EHIC card or an S1, S2 or S3 form.

- Films: no licence is required for 'not-for-profit' film exhibition held in community premises between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day provided that the audience does not exceed 500 and the organiser (a) gets consent to the screening from a person who is responsible for the premises; and (b) ensures that each such screening abides by age classification ratings.
- Indoor sporting events: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 1000.
- Boxing or Wrestling Entertainment: no licence is required for a contest, exhibition or display of Greco-Roman wrestling, or freestyle wrestling between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 1000. Combined fighting sports defined as a contest, exhibition or display which combines boxing or wrestling with one or more martial arts are licensable as a boxing or wrestling entertainment rather than an indoor sporting event.
- Live music: no licence permission is required for:
 - o a performance of unamplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, on any premises.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a workplace that is not licensed to sell alcohol on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
 - o a performance of amplified live music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital.
- Recorded Music: no licence permission is required for:
 - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day on premises authorised to sell alcohol for consumption on those premises, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
 - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, in a church hall, village hall, community hall, or other similar community premises, that is not licensed by a premises licence to sell alcohol, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance from a person who is responsible for the premises.
 - o any playing of recorded music between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, at the non-residential premises of (i) a local authority, or (ii) a school, or (iii) a hospital, provided that (a) the audience does not exceed 500, and (b) the organiser gets consent for the performance on the relevant premises from: (i) the local authority concerned, or (ii) the school proprietor or (iii) the health care provider for the hospital.

- Dance: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 500. However, a performance which amounts to adult entertainment remains
- Cross activity exemptions: no licence is required between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, with no limit on audience size for:
 - any entertainment taking place on the premises of the local authority where the entertainment is provided 0 by or on behalf of the local authority;
 - any entertainment taking place on the hospital premises of the health care provider where the 0 entertainment is provided by or on behalf of the health care provider;
 - any entertainment taking place on the premises of the school where the entertainment is provided by or 0 on behalf of the school proprietor; and
 - any entertainment (excluding films and a boxing or wrestling entertainment) taking place at a travelling 0 circus, provided that (a) it takes place within a moveable structure that accommodates the audience, and (b) that the travelling circus has not been located on the same site for more than 28 consecutive days.





To whom it may concern,

I am writing to express my opposition to the licence application made by Sukhwinder Singh of VS Stores, 2 Prince Road, Kenfig Hill, CF33 6ED.

My objections to the licence application are as follows:

There is private accommodation directly opposite the premises which houses residents with alcohol addiction and substance misuse issues. This is a major concern as these people already congregate outside their premises and on the bench four doors down from the store to engage in such activities, which intimidates and scares local residents, as well as the knock off effect of litter being left at that location (especially glass bottles) and anti-social behaviour.

There is also a council run hostel (Glyn Cynffig) two streets behind the store which is a rehabilitation centre housing residents with issues resulting from substance misuse (drugs and alcohol).

It would take only a few minutes to walk from there to the store.

VS Stores used to be an old post office and general store without an alcohol licence, therefore it was not a magnet or temptation for people with these issues. As a retired police officer, I am well aware of the risk of temptation for substance users and alcohol dependents when such items are readily available to purchase on their doorstep. It is less of a temptation if you have to actually make a conscious decision to go out of your home to a store further away to purchase alcohol and/or other addictive substances.

I believe that Bridgend Council have a duty of care to the residents of those premises housing vulnerable people, as well as to the local community who would suffer the adverse effects of alcohol being available at VS Stores.

The premises, as it was before, has never held an alcohol licence as it has not been necessary, and that has been an asset to the local community and surrounding streets. There are many other off licence establishments locally that are open all day should someone feel the need to purchase alcohol and they are within walking distance from the proposed licenced premises. Why do we need yet another one? Surely this is just another way of spreading custom very thin between the stores which will lead to loss of custom to established stores?

There is a Bargain Booze store a couple of minutes walk away on Commercial Street, along with a Morrisons daily store on the opposite corner so there is no shortage of places to purchase alcohol or groceries. There are also many other shops along Commercial Street and the adjoining Pisgah Street; within 0.8 miles there are eight off licence stores, and that is without all the public houses and clubs readily serving alcohol. And in the other direction, there are several other off licence stores and licensed pubs/sports clubs within walking distance.

We have a lot of alcohol related anti-social behaviour in the area. I know that lots of it goes unreported, however it is an issue for local residents. As a result, a lot of local residents have installed private doorbell cameras/cctv cameras due to the behaviour of obviously intoxicated people at all hours of the day and night.

There is no parking at the location as there are yellow double lines along the street directly outside the shop. The opposite side of the road where there aren't yellow lines is constantly full with parked vehicles of residents, and customers of other local businesses. At times of high volume traffic (such as school pick up and drop off times) it is hard to get down Prince Road as it is due to double parking and careless parking.

There is also a takeaway restaurant on the end of the street, next to VS Stores, which has several delivery vehicles parked on the double yellow lines from 4pm daily, which causes issues for drivers and pedestrians as they often park on the pavement or on the actual corner of the street which causes problems with visibility of potential hazards for motorists. If VS Stores was granted a licence, then this would obviously cause more traffic in the area, more cars

parking illegally and more risk to pedestrians and other road users, as well as congestion at the location. It would also cause more noise pollution for local residents as the store has never been open late.

I would also like to bring to your attention that a cafe opened in 2021 at 6, Commercial Street, Kenfig Hill, which is literally around the corner from VS Stores (doors away) but was denied planning permission for that business as a result of the Highways Agency stating that the location of the cafe would pose a disruption to the flow of traffic as they have double yellow lines on the road directly outside the premises. This business, as a result, closed after just three months of trading. There is no reason to suspect that this issue wouldn't still be an issue at VS Stores.

Suzie's cafe owners were also told by the planning department at Bridgend Council that it was unlikely that planning permission would be granted anyway due to the proximity of local schools. This again, will still be an issue for VS Stores as the school is still in the same place, 0.2 miles from VS Stores (directly across the main road).

There is an infants school steps away from VS Stores, and a primary school a few streets away (0.4 miles). Both schools use the Talbot Institute (a building directly opposite VS Stores) on a regular basis for school events and concerts (during school hours and outside of these hours). The Junior school also uses the facilities of the infant school, and to do this they walk the pupils across from their school to the other. This means that quite regularly we see young children crossing the roads (with teachers supervision) in the area.

A premises readily selling alcohol in that exact area all day will just attract the attention of more undesirable characters as well as more traffic which in turn will impact the young children who may be travelling between the schools and to the Talbot institute. They do not need to be exposed to such behaviour while they are attending school events.

There is a licensed premises, Kenfig Hill Labour Club, directly opposite VS Stores, so if anyone is desperate for an alcoholic drink, then it is readily available. We do not need an off licence in the exact same area.

And does anyone really need to be purchasing alcohol at 6am in the morning or at 10pm at night? The hours applied for are totally excessive for a small

store servicing just a few streets as the other stores locally serve the streets closest to them. This store will not be a destination store as it will not be offering any service that isn't already available locally at other locations.

I thank you for taking the time to read and consider my objections and would please ask that you take my objections on board when making your decision.

I would have submitted this sooner however the licensing application notice has only appeared on the stores' front door in the past few days having previously only been displayed on the closed shutters, which would not have been seen during opening hours or in the day time.
