4. Presentation To Council By The Chief Fire Officer, South Wales Fire And Rescue Service

Decision Made	The Chief Executive presented a report that introduced Mr. Huw Jakeway and colleagues from the South Wales Fire and Rescue Service (SWFRS) to the meeting to give a presentation on the latest work of the Service. The Officers advised that the SWFRS covered the following County Borough's that included a varying
	number of Fire and Rescue establishments in each of these locations:- Bridgend Rhondda Cynon Taf Vale of Glamorgan Caerphilly Merthyr Tydfil Blaenau Gwent Torfaen Monmouth Cardiff Newport
	It was confirmed that each of the constituent Authorities committed a budget towards the operation of the South Wales Fire and Rescue Service that was in proportion of the population of each of the areas. The Service also was supported financially by a nominal amount of grant funding allocation. A large percentage of this budget he explained, went to employees, but this also included resource for the likes of Transport, Supplies, Training, Premises, Pensions and Capital Finance. In terms of the Service Medium Term Financial Strategy and the budgetary outlook, SWFRS shared with Members information on how funding was allocated to the SWFRS from the ten participating Authorities

and how its budget including from the local authorities, was allocated to the different services it supports, for example for their premises, training, employees and transport ie fleet, etc. A slide showed the budget for the current year compared with previous years as far back to 2009-10. It was emphasised that there were budget and inflationary pressures the SWFRS faced, similar to what other large organisations faced in the present climate.

Mr. Jakeway then shared with Members the number of different services the South Wales Fire and Rescue Service supports, which included putting out wildfires and flooding rescues, supporting NHS colleagues, road traffic collisions and large animal rescues. He added that the Service had also played a major role in community safety support, in incidents where fire is used to intentionally injure or kill.

The Service also reached out to schools, in order to educate young people about the dangers associated with fire.

He advised that the Service undertook approximately a significant number of home safety checks each year, that included Fire Risk Assessments and involved the installation in homes of hardware equipment, as well as giving advice to homeowners etc, about electrical safety measures residents should be mindful of.

The Service also had an active involvement with partner organisations around Sexual Abuse, Domestic Abuse and Human Trafficking, that included pathway signposting to referrals.

The Service also actively looked at issues of cladding, particularly in any high-rise buildings, in order to check their fire safety resistance levels.

In terms of future challenges the Service faced, he confirmed that some of the main ones here were:-

- · Cost of Living crisis and the impacts of this;
- Governance and Funding Reform;
- Welsh Government's ambition;
- Challenges of Climate Change;
- Ageing and Population Changes;
- Outcome of Independent Culture Review;
- Industrial Relationships; and
- Built Environment post Grenfell tragedy

Decision Made	The Chief Officer – Finance, Performance and Change submitted a report, which outlined the requirement for the Council to adopt a Council Tax Reduction (CTR) scheme for 2024-25 by 31 January 2024. If the Council did not adopt its own scheme by 31 January 2024, then such scheme would default to that applied by the Welsh Government.	
	This scheme provides vital assistance for those on low incomes with a liability to pay council tax.	
	Amendment regulations have been laid by Welsh Government uprating the financial figures used in the CTR schemes and making amendments to:	
	 disregard a Widowed Parents Allowance (WPA) back payment from the calculation of an applicant's capital and, for a period of 12 months, disregard a retrospective Bereavement Support Payment (BSP).
