Background and information

Bridgend has a strong track record for meeting a wide range of Additional Learning needs (ALN). The needs of learners are changing and the numbers of learners requiring specialist support are increasing.

Local authorities across the United Kingdom are experiencing a rise in the demand for services for children and young people with additional learning needs (ALN) and the cost to support this is often exceeding budget. Anecdotal evidence from many local authorities suggests that not only are these needs becoming more numerous by volume, but also in their complexity.

There is an increasing number of pupils who have more complex additional learning needs who require a more specialist setting for their learning needs to be met.

The law has changed as a result of the Additional Learning Needs and Educational Tribunal (Wales) Act 2018 (ALNET). This legislation places a requirement on local authorities to keep their provision for ALN under review. The Act also requires schools to respond differently to children and young people with additional needs. It is anticipated that the majority of these students will receive their education locally, with support provided at the school level through a variety of strategies tailored to meet the unique needs of each learner.

Schools in Bridgend are inclusive and continue to support children with additional learning needs and the majority of pupils with additional learning needs are educated in mainstream schools. The local authority has a role in maintaining this inclusive approach is consistent across all schools.

A Learning Resource Class (LRC) is a specialist Local Authority provision hosted at a community maintained (mainstream) school. These classes provide education places for pupils with ALN whose needs cannot be met in regular mainstream classes. Places in the LRCs are allocated by the Inclusion Group, ALN teams, following relevant assessments of need.

The proposal

This is a proposal to create the following six new Learning Resource Centres and redesignate one Learning Resource Centre with effect from 5 April 2027:

- ▶ One Foundation Phase Observation and Assessment class at Tondu Primary School;
- ▶ one Foundation Phase CARE base at Litchard Primary School;
- ▶ one Foundation Social and Communication base at Porthcawl Primary School creating 8 new places;
- ▶ an additional CARE base at Llangewydd Junior School;
- ▶ one secondary Communication Autism Resource Education (CARE) base for pupils at Porthcawl Comprehensive School;
- ▶ one secondary learning resource base to support pupils with Moderate Learning Difficulties (MLD) at Ysgol Gyfun Gymraeg Llangynwyd; and
- ▶ re-designate the Key Stage 2 Learning Resource Base from an MLD class to a CARE base to reflect the increased need for pupils presenting with Autism spectrum Disorder (ASD) and reduced need for MLD provision at Pencoed Primary School.

The consultation exercise will seek the views of staff, parents, pupils, interested parties and the governing body as the first step in the statutory process. If the proposals are supported, they would come into effect on 5 April 2027.

Why has this proposal been brought forward?

Over the past five years the number of pupils with additional learning needs has risen, driving an increasing demand for specialist teaching provision within Bridgend.

There are notable shifts in the types of needs among children and young people and in Bridgend currently the highest areas of need are for pupils with Emotional, Social and Behavioural Difficulties (ESBD) and Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD). While there is a recognized national rise in ASD cases, it is crucial to understand that not every individual with ASD requires a specialist placement or additional learning support, nor do they automatically necessitate an Individual Learning Plan (IDP).

The change in the law via the Additional Learning Needs and Education Tribunal (Wales) Act 2018 has meant the local authority have needed to review and respond to the changing legal requirements.

What the proposal means in practice

The proposal if approved would mean that:

- ▶ Appropriate placements which are well matched to pupils' primary needs.
- ▶ LRCs are an integrated part of mainstream schools.
- ▶ Improved educational outcomes and pupil engagement due to meeting identified pupil needs more effectively.
- ▶ Greater opportunities for mainstream inclusion in local community schools.
- ▶ Improved continuum of learning provision which improves life chances for our most vulnerable learners.
- ▶ The proposed additional classes will enhance LRC capacity across all age ranges.
- ▶ The LRC would provide a wider range of specialist learning facilities within the schools across the Bridgend County Borough area.

- ▶ The Council supports the principles that, as far as possible, children should be educated within a mainstream school environment and as near to their home as possible.

What are the advantages if the proposal goes ahead?

- ▶ There will be an increase in the number of places available for pupils with identified additional learning needs to access specialist support.
- ▶ The additional class will provide an appropriate environment in which pupils can develop and thrive within their peer group and have normal access to mainstream curriculum, where appropriate.

What are the potential disadvantages if the proposal goes ahead?

- ▶ There are no foreseen disadvantages to this proposal.

Impact of the proposals

Quality and standards in education;

- ▶ There will be no likely impact on the quality of outcomes, provision and leadership and management in schools in relation to the proposals.
- ▶ There will be no likely impact of the proposal on the ability of schools to deliver the full curriculum at each key stage of education.

Outcomes (standards and wellbeing);

- ▶ If progressed, the proposals are expected to:
 - improve access to specialist, high-quality provision within local mainstream schools;
 - provide appropriate accommodation and learning environments for pupils with ALN;

- support pupils' health, safety and wellbeing through provision tailored to need;
 - support increased inclusion by enabling pupils to access mainstream education alongside specialist support;
 - improve access to specialist accommodation and learning environments designed to meet learners' needs, including ensuring appropriate accessibility arrangements where required. Work required to improve learning environments will be funded by the ALN Capital Grant scheme.
- ▶ The proposals would also respond to:
- a clearly evidenced increase in demand for specialist ALN provision across Bridgend;
 - the changing profile of need, particularly in relation to ASD and complex needs;
 - the need to reduce reliance on out-of-county placements; and
 - the importance of provide local provision to reduce travel distances for many learners requiring specialist provision and reduce the need for transport to placements outside their local area.

The well-being goals and principles prescribed for within the Well-being of Future Generations (Wales) Act 2015 connect directly to the approach to supporting children, young people and their families. The approach is consistent with the five ways of working as defined within the sustainable development principle and more specifically as follows:

Long term	Affords pupils with additional learning needs a place in a school as near to their home as possible. Provides additional places required to meet the needs of an increase in pupils with additional learning needs.
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Prevention	Provision of locally based LRCs enables pupils to be educated as part of the graduated response as stipulated in the ALN Code of Practice and ultimately preventing being placed out-of-county.
Integration	LRC provision is key in ensuring that pupils with identified ALN have access to mainstream education experiences with their peers and also have the opportunity to reintegrate into mainstream where appropriate. There are also efficiencies related to this proposal as the cost of an out-of-authority place far outweighs the cost of opening an LRC locally.
Collaboration	A fundamental principal of the approach that focuses on improving collaboration and creating a unified system. There is excellent collaboration between the local authority with schools that have LRC's. The Inclusion Group provides on-going support, advice and guidance to all schools.
Involvement	A range of key stakeholders are involved with a pupil placed in LRCs ensuring that the individual needs of the pupil are met. Engagement of all potential stakeholders including Cabinet, members, governors, staff, pupils, community, internal and external partners will take place during the consultation exercise. There would be a full public consultation process undertaken, according to the Welsh Government School Organisation Code 2026, should Cabinet determine to proceed with the proposal.

Provision (learning experiences, teaching, staffing, care support and guidance, and learning environment);

- ▶ Pupil voice is a key part of the all school success in terms of leadership. This has been very successful in ensuring progress in performance across the school.

- ▶ All school identified to open new Learning Resource Centre classes have a good track record in raising the achievement of pupils, including vulnerable learners. High expectations, the strong focus on pupil wellbeing and nurturing pupils' confidence and self-esteem, impacts positively on learners' confidence, social and communication skills, and results in nearly all pupils making strong progress.
- ▶ There is a very strong focus on teaching across all Bridgend schools, with very good professional development to strengthen teaching further, as well as regular sharing of good practice between professional and other schools. As a result, teaching in LRCs is consistently good.

Leadership and management (leadership, improving quality, partnership working and resource management);

- ▶ Leaders and staff across all schools have a clear vision, high standards and expectations, and a strong focus on providing inclusive education of the highest standard for all pupils.
- ▶ Governing bodies are supportive, challenge standards effectively, and are well informed about school performance through regular presentations by staff and pupils. Detailed updates are provided by leaders to governors as well as regular involvement in learning walks, book scrutiny and listening to learners.
- ▶ Inclusion Group managers have developed a quality assurance process to monitor the quality and effectiveness of school based specialist provision.

Other considerations

- ▶ In developing these proposals, consideration has been given to the 2026 Code 26, including specific provisions relating to the reorganisation of specialist provision for pupils with additional learning needs. The review of

provision identified areas where demand has reduced, including Key Stage 2 MLD provision at Pencoed Primary School, allowing resources to be reconfigured to address increasing demand for ASD specialist provision.

► Due regard has also been given to:

- the Council's strategy for promoting inclusion and enabling more pupils with ALN to be educated within mainstream settings where appropriate to their needs.
- the need to ensure a sufficiency of high-quality specialist provision across the Authority;
- the requirement to regularly review provision to ensure it reflects changing learner needs and patterns of demand;
- the standards of provision, needs for places and accessibility and impact on other provision and services;
- the impact of these proposals on existing ALN provision within the Authority;
- the balance of provision across the county borough;
- the wider implications for inclusion services, educational psychology, specialist outreach, health services and support services for children and young people with ALN.
- whether regional provision would provide a more effective solution. It has been concluded that expanding local provision will better support inclusion, reduce travel and allow learners to be educated closer to home.

Quality and standards in education;

- ▶ Overall, standards of attainment across all schools are good. Across the schools, pupils make good or strong progress from their starting points, with particularly strong development in literacy, numeracy and subject knowledge, including pupils with additional learning needs.
- ▶ Inclusive practice and strong ALN support. Provision for pupils with additional learning needs is a strength across the schools, with tailored interventions, skilled staff, and multi-agency working enabling most pupils with ALN to make good progress.

Travel arrangements and accessibility impact

- ▶ The proposal would have no impact on the current travel arrangements as transport is available for those pupils who are eligible for a place at an LRC.

Land and buildings

- ▶ The proposal will not involve any potential transfer or disposal of land, nor is there any planned building associated with the proposal.

Impact Assessments

Community Impact Assessment

- ▶ There is no significant negative impact on the community (see Appendix A).

Welsh Language Impact Assessment

- ▶ The Council must consider the impact of a policy decision on the Welsh Language and seek views on the impact. The Council must consider the impact of a policy decision on the Welsh Language and seek views on the impact in accordance with the Welsh Language Standards Regulations 2015. This is a separate requirement which means that the Council must undertake an impact assessment and then questions must be asked about that assessment. The Welsh Language Impact Assessment (WLIA) is included

within the Consultation Document at Appendix 2 (see Appendix B). The School Organisation Code 2026 also requires a WLIA to be undertaken for all statutory proposals.

- ▶ The Welsh Language Impact Assessment (WLIA) concludes that the proposal is expected to have a positive impact on the Welsh language. The proposal supports the Council's commitment to providing equitable access to specialist Additional Learning Needs (ALN) provision through the medium of Welsh and contributes to the objectives of the Welsh in Education Strategic Plan (WESP) and Cymraeg 2050. Existing Welsh-medium specialist provision, including CARE and Moderate Learning Difficulties (MLD) classes, will be maintained, while the proposed establishment of a Welsh-medium Learning Resource Base at Ysgol Gyfun Gymraeg Llangynwyd will strengthen specialist pathways available to Welsh-speaking learners. The proposal therefore supports opportunities for learners to continue their education through the medium of Welsh, treats Welsh no less favourably than English, and promotes the long-term sustainability of Welsh-medium ALN provision across the county borough.

► **Equality Impact Assessment**

The Council has a duty to consider the implications of this proposal on all members of the local community who may be affected unfairly as a result of the proposal being carried out.

- An initial impact screening assessment has been undertaken (see Appendix A) on the proposal which indicates that a full Equality Impact Assessment will be undertaken in parallel with the consultation process. The outcomes and actions identified by this assessment will be included in a report to Cabinet following the consultation process.
- If you have any views on the potential of this proposal to affect any groups or individuals either positively or adversely, then we would welcome your comments as part of this consultation. Please see consultation proforma.

Risks

- There are no current risks associated with this proposal. The LRC will increase the expertise amongst the school staff to accommodate the needs of other pupils who in mainstream classes with ALN. The full EIA will assess any potential impacts.

Alternatives

- Alternative options considered are doing nothing and continuing with current model.
- The advantages of this would minimise disruption for schools and minimise workload for officers.
- The disadvantages would be not having enough specialist places to meet demand. Continuing with settings which do not reflect the current and future needs of children and young people.
- Not being able to offer specialist provision pace leaves the Authority vulnerable to increased challenge from parents through Education Tribunal for Wales.
- Not being able to offer local places to children and young people meaning they will need to travel further away from home to access places resulting in increasing costs of home to school transport.

Finance

- ▶ Funding levels in the primary sector would be on a class basis, derived from notional staffing requirements and are primarily based on the salaries of teachers and support staff. The funding to be allocated to the secondary sector is based on the number of places. One-off funding for the set-up costs would be £10k for each LRC
- ▶ As part of the Medium-Term Financial Strategy (MTFS) 2025-2026 Council approved budget growth of £370k towards supporting an increasing number of pupils being referred for support and specialist provision. Council approved a further £800k in 2026-27 towards Additional Learning Needs pressures including additional resource bases in schools, of which, £211k is proposed to be used to support these proposals. The overall funding of £581k will be used to fund the six new classes at Tondu Primary School, Litchard Primary School, Llangewydd Junior School, Porthcawl Primary School and Porthcawl Comprehensive School, including the set-up costs, should the proposal go ahead.
- ▶ Additional funding to set up the Welsh-medium learning resource base was approved in 2022-23 and is currently retained as part of the Individual Schools Budget (ISB) until the consultation process is completed.

- ▶ The required changes to the MLD Learning Resource Base classroom in Pencoed Primary were identified when there were no referrals due reduced demand for MLD places at Key Stage 2. The space and staffing have been utilised to support a small number of pupils with ASD and is currently funded as an MLD. Where additional staffing is required this is currently funded through the ancillary staffing budget.
- ▶ The combined MTFS allocations are sufficient to meet the cost of the proposed provision, including the six new LRCs and associated set-up costs, with existing resources being reconfigured where provision is being re-designated.

The consultation process

- ▶ The consultation process will be completed by 31 December 2026 and the outcomes (which will be incorporated into the proposal where possible) will be reported to Cabinet. If there is a decision not to proceed, that will be the end of this proposal for the future and alternative proposals will need to be sought.
- ▶ If the decision is to go ahead, a statutory notice outlining the proposals would need to be published for a period of 28 days. If there are no objections to the proposal, then it will go ahead subject to final approval by Cabinet. If there are objections an objection report must be published. Cabinet could determine to accept, reject or modify the proposal. It is proposed to implement the proposal from 5 April 2027.
